Merry Makers

Army Captain Paden Sickles will speak at the January 8 Merry Makers meeting in the Fellowship Hall. Captain Sickles, an engineer, has just completed nearly a decade of service in the US Army. Her transition into civilian life included the formation of SickFit, a unique sock, streetwear, and custom embroidery company encouraging fashion, conversation, comfort, and empowerment.

Sickles says that SickFit was started on a hot summer day in Texas after she completed a 12-mile ruck march for Air Assault School, and her feet were destroyed. It was then that she knew that boot socks and performance socks lacked quality, innovation, and design. At that point, she pledged to do better for our service members and their families.



Captain Sickles recently competed in the Second Service Foundation's national Military Entrepreneur Challenge, where she got to pitch her business to a private panel of judges. She ended the competition in second place and received \$6,000 in start-up capital and \$25,000 pro-bono legal services, which she will utilize to scale her business to the next level while protecting her brand with risk management.

Paden is a Kentucky girl who grew up near Louisville. She has a contagious and winsome personality. She will so captivate her audience that Merry Makers may decide to enlist in the Army--or at least begin wearing different socks!
