September marks our return to our school year programming schedule and the beginning of our mid-week dinner, Bible studies, Children's Choirs, and youth small groups. "Wednesday Night at Wesley" will resume on September 10. We have postponed the beginning by a week as we continue to make adjustments around the repair of our sanctuary and the limitation of space it creates for us.

The weekly habit of coming to church for fellowship and study in the middle of our week bridges the gap between Sundays and keeps us grounded in the middle of the hectic pace of our lives. While a week passes like the blink of an eye, spiritually speaking, it can be a long journey from Sunday to Sunday. Wednesday becomes like an oasis on a journey through the desert. One of the things that characterized the early church and contributed to the growth spiritually and numerically was how often they "gathered together" for fellowship, study, and worship. They recognized discipleship was a group effort and a daily activity. If you've never been a part of the Wednesday night program, we encourage you to give it a try. The food is great, the fellowship sweet, the study relevant, and the children's ministry exciting and meaningful. There is something for all ages to help strengthen our faith.

Dinner begins each week at 5:30 p.m. At 6:00 p.m., Children's Choirs and youth small groups meet, and a nursery is available for our youngest children. Monica and Ericka can help you get your children signed up for the program. The youth will have Wednesday night Bible Study. This year, we will offer a young women's small

group and two adult studies from which to choose. Glen Doki will teach the spiritual classic Pilgrim's Progress by John Bunyan. I will teach a short study on "Living as United Methodist Christians," followed by a Bible Study on the book of Jonah.





#### A Tale of Two Mission Months

Report from Wesley member and Misson on the Move volunteer Melinda Smith



"When I embarked on the adventure of a two month adventure with Mission on the Move in Honduras this summer, one of my primary questions coming into the entire experience was...will there be enough for me to do? Is there a need for what I have to offer? Two months is a long time. That's a lot of days to fill. And what I've discovered is that not only have my days been filled, they have been blessed and valued. Quite simply they have been life-changing. And in my tale of two months, June and July could not have been more different in terms of the work that I did and the benefit that I reaped from being here as a result of it.

June was all about the teams. I've shared with you the work done by these two teams. Every time I'm in or around the elementary school the fruits of the labors of those teams are still being enjoyed. Every day.

And then July came. And with it a week of summer vacation for students and a three week break between teams. And things began to look a bit uncertain for me here. What would be my work during this time? How would I contribute? Did I even need to stay?

And what I found was that while the work was different in July, it was as impactful, if not more, for me in this experience as running teams was in June.

The running of teams is administrative and logistical - making sure that teams are engaged in their work and that they have what they need to get that work done. The work that happened for me in July was connectional - engaging on a deeper, more personal level with the children at The Oaks, the students in the education program, and the adults that serve this program on a daily basis.



Sitting at the picnic table on the mission property, I talked with children about both their joys and their challenges of being in school. At the CCCC, I talked with the lead teacher about the importance of the work that she does with the children of this community that have special needs, and the pride she feels when her students go from her classroom to the local school classroom due to the progress in the their development. I listened as our program director shared about the conversations she has with young women in the youth program. Conversations that aren't about books and learning but about being who God has created you to be - saying no to temptations all around you, challenging the expectations of those

around you, and finding strength and comfort in adults around you that support you as you make hard choices.

Because of the school break, I also enjoyed field trips with the children at The Oaks. A trip to the local swimming pool where I comforted a child afraid of the water slide until he was able to take a deep breath and make the trip down the slide on my lap. A nature walk to a local lake where we enjoyed stone skipping, bird watching, and a charming conversation about how birds fly and what they're thinking when they do. And at the end of the week, I

began to work with the staff and house parents at The Oaks to create a costume for the Dia Del Indio celebration at the school the following week. To be included in the preparation for this important cultural heritage event at the school and in the community was a true joy.

Throughout this experience, I have been led by a Bible verse that has held meaning for me throughout my life from the prophet Micah. "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God." Serving this community through the work of Mission on the Move has been not only a grand adventure - but also a profound and powerful spiritual experience that has changed my heart and brought me closer to God in ways that I could never have imagined.

### Sanctuary Ceiling

On the evening of Monday, July 21, a section of our sanctuary ceiling broke loose and fell, causing significant damage. Thankfully, nobody was in the sanctuary at the time. We are now engaged in the costly and time-consuming process of removing the entire sanctuary ceiling, including the damaged portion, and restoring the sanctuary.

While architects, engineers, and construction experts are still evaluating the space, the removal and repair process for the entire sanctuary ceiling is currently estimated to take several months.
